

MISS COLLETT IS TOURNEY MEDALIST

Leads Strong Field in Annual Shenecossett Women's Golf Championship.

EASTERN POINT, New London, Conn., Aug. 1.—Miss Glenna Collett of the Rhode Island Country Club won the medal in the annual Shenecossett Country Club championship here today from one of the strongest fields that ever took part in an Eastern women's golf tournament. Miss Collett, who is but 18, is the present champion of Shenecossett, and last year tied for the medal with Mrs. Ronald Barlow, but lost in the play-off. Her game today was rather uncertain over the first nine holes, but she settled down after the turn and came home in 41. Her winning the medal was partly due to holding out a mashie approach on the fourteenth for a birdie three.

Both Miss Marlon Hollins and Mrs. W. A. Gavin of Belleclair had rounds of 88 and should have beaten out Miss Collett, as they led her by three strokes at the end of the first twelve holes.

Miss Hollins well down badly at the long thirteenth, where she took eight strokes. This was due to missing a couple of iron shots to the closely trapped green. A birdie two fell to her lot at the short fifteenth, but it did not help much, because a bad second shot at the seventeenth cost her a seven, and the best she could do was 88. This was just six strokes worse than her record round made yesterday.

Mrs. Gavin was not playing as well as she can play and missed several opportunities to do better on the homeward journey. She slipped badly on the sixteenth with a seven, three strokes over par. A sand trap was directly responsible for this. She made a beautiful approach on the home hole for her four, which insured her a tie with Miss Hollins, and it looked for a while as if this would have to be played off, but Miss Collett spoiled the fun for the gallery by returning an 87. Mrs. Arnold Jackson of Greenwich might have been in the tie for second place had it not been for two aggravating putts that refused to drop.

Mrs. Owen Moore, wife of the well-known movie star, got away to a bad start with 17 on the first hole, and just when she got over the shock of this bit of hard luck another disaster befell her on the fifth, where 13 was the result. Her total of 227 beat Mrs. Raymond Balfe by two strokes.

The committee had become anxious about the pair and thought from the scores turned in that they had gone around the course twice, but it later developed that only eighteen holes were played.
