

MISS COLLETT WINS GOLF PLAY TROPHY

**National Champion Defeats
Miss Cummings by 2 and 1
on Shenecossett Links.**

LEADS THROUGHOUT MATCH

**Captures First Four Holes and
Maintains Excellent Form—Op-
ponent Presses All the Way.**

NEW LONDON, Conn., Aug. 31.—Miss Glenna Collett of the Rhode Island C. C., women's national golf champion, defeated Miss Edith Cummings of Onwentsla by 2 and 1 in the final round of the Shenecossett women's invitation tournament here today. Miss Collett won the Griswold trophy from Miss Cummings. Miss Collett played wonderful golf from the start today, winning the first four holes. She never lost the lead at any time during the match, although Miss Cummings always was dangerous.

The champion won the first hole with a par 4 and the second with a birdie 3 after a magnificent spoon shot to the pin. Miss Collett almost sank a mashie approach on the third and won it with a par 4. She took the next with an easy 4 after Miss Cummings failed to get it with a 5. Miss Cummings won the long fifth after sinking a long putt for a birdie 4. After two beautiful wooden shots and a short approach, Miss Collett missed her putt and took a 5. They halved the short sixth in 4s.

Miss Cummings had a pretty birdie 4 on the eighth, but Miss Collett got a half to save her lead of three with a long putt across the green. Miss Collett was even 4s to here.

Both Top Drives.

They both topped their drives on the eighth. Miss Cummings was on in 3 for a 5, but Miss Collett's pitch was short and trapped. She took a 6. Both were on in 3 at the difficult ninth. Miss Collett missed a putt for a par 4, and then Miss Cummings followed suit by failing to get an easy one. Miss Collett was out in 39, 2 up. Miss Cummings was out in 43.

They halved the tenth as each got a nice par 4. They also halved the difficult short eleventh in 4s, as Miss Cummings was off in the rough and Miss Collett in a trap.

They halved the twelfth in par 5s. Miss Collett conceding her opponent what the gallery considered a difficult half-stymie. The Providence star had an exceptionally good par 5 on the 538-yard thirteenth. Miss Cummings required a 7 as she topped a little mashie pitched into a trap.

Putt Rims Edge.

Miss Collett had a chance to become dormie 4 with a victory on the fourteenth, but she took three putts and they halved in 5s. On the short fifteenth Miss Cummings sank a very long putt for a birdie 2. Miss Collett tried bravely to stay with her on this hole, but took a 3 when her putt rimmed the edge.

Both played the sixteenth well and they halved in par 4s, making the champion dormie 2. On the seventeenth Miss Cummings put a long iron on the far edge of the treacherous green, a beautiful shot. Miss Collett, who had a beautiful drive, brought the gallery to applause by an even better iron shot to within two feet of the pin. Miss Cummings failed to sink her putt and got a par 4 for a half when Miss Collett took 2 to put the ball in the cup and end the match.
