

## MISS COLLETT WINS GRISWOLD GOLF CUP

**Captures Trophy Outright by  
Beating Mrs. Sterrett in New  
London Final, 1 Up.**

## VICTOR IN UPHILL FIGHT

**Loss of First Hole Puts Her on De-  
fensive—Missed Putt at 18th  
Decides Match.**

NEW LONDON, Conn., July 31.—Miss Glenna Collett won the Griswold trophy today, defeating Mrs. H. D. Sterrett of Hutchinson, Kansas, 1 up, after one of the hardest and most bitterly contested matches of her career. Miss Collett was on the defensive almost all the time for the first nine holes, having all she could do to even matters with the hard driving, accurate putting Kansas star who took the first hole and waged an aggressive fight against the Providence girl from then on.

The battle swayed back and forth constantly. Miss Collett managed to even matters at the turn and then was able to carry the battle to Mrs. Sterrett. She held Mrs. Sterrett safely from then on and beat her by one stroke on the eighteenth.

The play of the game was never better illustrated than in today's match. Mrs. Sterrett had been almost unbeatable on her putts from the beginning of the match. Time after time she thrilled the big gallery by her masterly putts. No matter how far from the pin she lay, the Kansas golfer always was dangerous. Yet, on the eighteenth hole when she lay a scant yard from the hole and with the match depending on it, she missed the putt.

### Miserable Weather Prevails.

Miss Collett played beautiful golf to win after getting away to a bad start by losing the first hole. The match was played under miserable weather conditions. Rain fell almost constantly, but the big gallery, while drenched, seemed oblivious of everything but the match.

After the match the prizes were awarded by President J. P. Taylor Armstrong of the Shencosssett Club. The Griswold trophy now becomes the permanent possession of Miss Collett who already had won it twice.

Miss Collett lost the first hole, 8 to 4. Both made long drives to the right of the course and producing much longer No. 2 shots than has been the rule in first flight matches in this tournament. Mrs. Sterrett was almost on in two, but Miss Collett landed in the trap and took two to get out and on the green. She missed her putt and conceded the hole when Mrs. Sterrett got on in three by a fine approach shot.

Mrs. Sterrett drove into the rough, on the second shot onto the road and sank a putt after a fine approach. Miss Collett was on in 2, barely missing a long putt for a birdie 3, and they halved the hole with a par 4. Both players made good approaches to the third. Miss Collett sinking a long putt and winning the hole, 4 to 5.

On the fourth both were on the green in 3, Miss Collett rolling to the extreme corner, from which she holed in two putts, losing when Mrs. Stretzell sank her putt for a birdie 2, again leaving the Western contender one up. They divided the fifth with 5s when Miss Collett missed a putt but cruised her opponent. Mrs. Stretzell was in 3 on the sixth and had a better lie than Miss Collett, but conceded the hole, 4 to 6, when the latter rimmed the cup on her third.

### Match Again Squared.

That made the match even again, but on the seventh Mrs. Sterrett was 1 up again when, with a remarkable approach, she laid the ball dead on the pin for a birdie 4. On the eighth both drives were better than 225 yards and the hole was halved. At the turn the match was even again when Mrs. Sterrett, landing at the road with a clump of trees between her and the green, conceded the hole, 4 to 7.

Miss Collett won the tenth, 4 to 5, making her 1 up, but her lead was brief, for on the very next hole Mrs. Sterrett sank a long putt for a birdie 2 after both had driven to the green.

The twelfth and thirteenth were halved, but Miss Collett won the next, 3 to 4. That put her one up again, but in the fifteenth her lead was snatched away once more, when Mrs. Sterrett won, 3 to 4, evening the match when Miss Collett missed her second putt. They divided the sixteenth with 4 each and the seventeenth with par 6s.

With the match still even Mrs. Sterrett started the eleventh by driving into a trap, but elected to be treated with a spectacular recovery, followed by an approach that dropped almost into the hole. Miss Collett made a fine 200-yard drive and was on the green in two. She missed her long putt. Mrs. Sterrett missed her putt, a ridiculously easy one compared to several she made during today's match. Miss Collett then sank her putt and the match was over.

Mrs. R. H. Barlow Merion won the final match in the second flight by defeating Mrs. E. C. Stone, Belmont Springs, 7 and 6.
