NEW YORK Y. C. CRUISE WILL BE STARTED HERE

THE FLEET TO RENDEZVOUS IN LOCAL HARBOR MONDAY, AUGUST 2

The New York Yacht club fleet will rendezvous here August 2 for the annual cruise and races for the Astor cup, the latter to be held off Newport on August 4. These will be in classes for schooners, cutters and yawls and in the Class H special. The race for the King's cup, presented by King George V, will be run off Marblehead, August 11. The schedule, as contained in the sailing instructions issued by the club, is as follows:

New London to Newport, August 2—From a mark anchored to the southward and eastward of Sarah's Ledge bell buoy, to Brenton Reef light vessel, leaving Race Rock, Fishers Island, Point Judith whistle buoy and Brenton Reef light vessel to port; 40 miles.

Newport, August 4—Races for the Astor cup. Warning signal at 11:15 a. m.

Newport to Buzzard's bay, August 5—From Brenton Reef light vessel to mark anchored one mile eastward of northeast corner of dumping ground, off West Fairmouth, leaving both buoys of Sakonnet point and Hen and Chickens light vessel to port and finishing mark to starboard; 33 miles.

Provincetown to Marblehead, August 7—From Black buoy off Long point to Halfway rock, leaving it to starboard; 41 miles.

Marblehead to Gloucester, August 9—From Halfway rock to Whistle buoy 2 A, off Eastern point, leaving Boston light vessel and Whistle buoy to port; 24 miles.

Gloucester to Marblehead, August 10—From Whistle buoy 2 R off Eastern point, to Halfway rock leaving Cape Ann whistle buoy, Boston light vessel and Halfway rock to starboard; 27 miles.

BIG FIELD OF GOLFERS IS TO PLAY AT SHENECOSSETT SOME OF COUNTRY'S BEST

Professionals and Amateurs Start Two Days' Tournament at the Griswold This Morning—Play in Open Championship, With 80 Entries, Will Be Begun Saturday Morning With 36 Holes in Play—Golfers Enthuse Over Course—The Entries

Today and tomorrow are the big days in golf at the Shenecossett Country club, and a field of about 80 professionals and amateurs from all parts of the country are present to win cash prizes, medals and cups, as well as renown in the royal game. Drawings for partners were held yesterday afternoon, and 41 professionals and 32 amateurs were assigned. About all of the players were at the clubhouse yesterday, and at some time during the day all had played the 18 holes. Those who have played the course before said it was never in better condition, and the newcomers were delighted. Elmer W. Loving, one of the best known professional golfers of the country, said it came pretty near approaching the best over which he had played. Alex Smith, who is the best known of the visiting professionals, said its improvement over last year was noticeable. Incidentally, Alex Smith was the attraction for the largest gallery of the day.

The program for today calls for an early start at 8:30, when there will be a two ball match for those professionals who were not paired with the amateurs. The players will start at intervals of four minutes. At 9 o'clock will start the four ball amateur-professional contest, in which there will be 64 starters.

This afternoon, beginning at 3 o'clock, the driving competition for professionals will begin. This event, with the professional approaching and putting competition at 4:30, will undoubtedly attract a big gallery.

The International News service, which concerns furnishes news pictures for The Telegraph, in common with other papers of the country, will have operators on hand to take both still and motion pictures of the plays and players.

Tomorrow morning, starting at 9 o'clock, will be the beginning of the Shenecossett open championship. Eighteen holes will be played in the morning, and 18 in the afternoon, starting at 2 o'clock. This is for professionals only. Cash awards will be made for low scores.
