HE first annual championship for women members of clubs of Fairfield and Westchester Counties will be held over the West course of the Westchester Country Club, Rye, New York, on September 30th, October 1st and October 2nd. This tournament will be the first of its kind held in this section and will be somewhat like

the Eastern, being 54 holes of medal play extending over three days.

The prize played for will be known as the Elizabeth Wheeler tropby, the same having been donated by Mrs. 1. M. Wheeler, a former Metropolitan Champion, who has long been a prominent figure in golfing circles and who originated this annual affair. The tropby must be won three times by the same player before permanent possession is gained and is to be played for annually over different courses throughout the Fairfield and Westchester sections. Being a new medal play event in this section an unusually large entry is expected.

The Shenecossett Invitation golf tournament for women was won for the second year in succession by Miss Edith Quier, of Reading, Pa., when she defeated Mrs. Dorothy Campbell Hurd, also of Philadelphia, four and two in the 18-hole final. The medalist in this tournament was 19-year-old Miss Frances Williams, who scored an 80 to lead a field of over 200 players. Thus, Miss Williams maintained her reputation as a competent medal golfer since she had already established herself in the front ranks of women's golf by winning the Eastern Championship at the Country Club of Boston on her first entry in that tournament

Miss Williams is a natural golfer and should go far in tournament golf, Miss Quier, who was the defending champion, played easily to defeat

Mrs. S. S. Laird in the first round, Mrs. Ronald Barlow in the second, Mrs. Benjamin Briggs in the third and Miss Williams in the semi-finals, while Mrs. Hurd was disposing of Mrs. E. H. Fitler, Mrs. Phillip Corson (the former Miss Helen Payson), Mrs. J. B. Kirby and Mrs. H. B. Stetson in the semi-finals.

A feature of this tournament was the fine play of 15-year-old Miss Dorothy Jamin, of White Beeches, New Jersey, who qualified in the championship flight with a score of ninety and after winning her first round match, 4 and 3, from Mrs. Sidney Martin, succumbed in the second round to the fine playing of Miss Jane Broadwell, who, however, could not win from the younger player until the battle went to the 19th hole.

Miss Jane Brooks, of Rockland County, played some of the best golf of her career to win the Women's Westchester Country Club Invitation tournament (for which there was an entry of 160 players) by the margin of one up at 18 holes, from Miss Frances Williams of the Lehigh Country Club.

Mrs. Thomas Hucknall was medalist with a score of 83 made over the South course, a score which should have been much better but for the intense heat which caused the scoring to run generally high. Mrs. Hucknall, however, succumbed in the first round of match play to the good playing of Mrs. V. N. Beig, of Merion Cricket, who defeated the medalist on the 20th hole. Mrs. Beig caused
