By accident, the great heat of summer in such old countries as Greece coincided with the beliacal rising of Sirius, or the dog star, the brightest and largest of all the fixed stars, situated in the mouth of Canis Major, stand a half For this reason, the people and astronomers of those days became convinced than earned : that the 20 days preceding the 20 days following the rising of the star caused the heat and diseases of mid-summer, and the legend has persisted to this day. The fact that owing to precession the star rises later every year in all stitudes and its rising depends upon latitude itself, has had little influence on this popular idea. In time the dog star will rise helically in the dead of winter, but no doubt the population of modern countries will expect the dog days to occur in August just the same and will be convinced that any unpleasantly hot weather is directly due, to the star' influence.
